

Final Transportation Plan at All Hands meeting



- Travelers leave Saturday, July 1 at 6 a.m. From St Julies unless otherwised agreed to.
- Passport check before leaving San Jose.
- Cars do not stay together in caravan.
- > 8-10 Hour drive to arrive in San Diego by 4pm.
- Stop for lunch, Usually on Highway 5.
- Stay in phone contact with others.
- Cross together at Otay Mesa Border.

Where We Stay: Maria Imaculada Parish Compound



Terrazas II Site

- All travelers stay at Terrazas II
- Compound is enclosed and gated with 24/7 security
- □ Two 2 story dorms with bathrooms on each floor with 3-4 showers, sinks, and toilets.
- Men and Women sleep in separate dorms.
- □ Some cots provided, <u>urge you to</u> <u>bringing your own</u>. Only single wide mattresses.



Where We Stay, Continued

Terrazas I Site

Compound is enclosed and gated with 24/7 security. About 1 mile from TII.

- □ 1 story building with kitchen area, chapel, classrooms, outdoor shaded tables.
- Construction storage, pre-build and painting done at this site
- ☐ Storage for trailers and car overflow.





View Where We Stay Details

What We Eat

- Most food brought from US; some food bought locally
- □ Home Site / Cook Team prepares breakfast each day (variety of hot & cold choices)
- Home Site / Cook Team prepares lunches for Building Teams
 - ☐ Sack lunches of sandwiches, fruits, snacks, drinks).
- ☐ Lunches delivered to build sites about 10:30 a.m.

- Some dinners cooked by local parish women under Cook Team guidance and direction
- Local vegetables are fully cooked; fruit is carefully washed with bottled water. US purchased fresh fruit and vegetables included in the menus.
- Do not buy from local market vendors
- Drink only bottled water we provide
- Let us know of special dietary restrictions (on application form) and discuss with Joan Mibach before travel.

6:30 am	Breakfast - Morning Prayer
7:15 am	Construction Teams Load up and drive to sites
7:30 am	Home Site: Clean breakfast and begin to prepare lunches
7:30 am	Week 1 Children, Teens, Mothers programs set up for AM session
9:00 am	Week 1 Morning Programs begin Monday – Thursday
10:30 am	Lunches and Snacks delivered to job sites
11:30 am	Week 1 Morning Programs end

Personal Safety and A Few Rules

- ➤ Don't be a Target
 - ➤ We are in a poor area.
 - Dress Conservatively
- > Health
 - ➤ Drink Plenty of Water
 - ➤ Covid Test before 7/1
 - ➤ Sun protection

- ➤ Safety in the Compound
 - ≥24 hr security provided.
 - ➤ Keep dorms locked.
- Personal Safety & Courtesy
 - ➤ No alcohol
 - ➤ Stay in Groups
 - ➤ Money & gifts only through programs.

Packing

- Pack light, comfortable, reusable.
- No laundry on-site.
- Pack your own toiletries.
- Nothing fancy nice casual for Mass.
- We have some cots bring your own single wide light weight cot, inflatable mattress or sleeping pad.

- Bring own towel, sleeping bag, pillow, blanket, linens.
- □ Bring ear plugs if you're light sleeper – snoring, barking, roosters.



House 3: Virginia Ureta Lopez

Virginia lives with her husband and children, the eldest son is 27, the middle son is 22 and has an intellectual disability. The third child is 13 years old.

The mother has problems with her hip and is often confined to a wheel chair. It is nearly impossible for her to get around her house which has been pieced together on multiple levels. You can see that their home is open to the outside elements. Much of their income is spent on medical treatments.

We will be adding an additional 8 feet to the common living area of this house.



House 1: Elizabeth Judith Silva Velasco.

This is an older couple with three children. Eldest son is 16, a 4 year old daughter, and a one year old boy. The husband has a disability of his spine and it is difficult for him to work. The family recently suffered a fire where they lost their home and possessions.

The five of them are living in one small room built over the old foundation with a separate out house structure for a bathroom.



House 2: Maria de Jesus

Maria is a senior who has taken over sole responsibility for her two grandsons. The oldest grandson is 14 and the youngest is 12.

Their home consists of a single room structure. There is a small cinder block structure behind this purple house where one of the boys sleeps. The roof on both structures is bad and water pours in when it rains, leaving behind mold and decay that the family lives in.
